

injuries that might embarrass the good name of the River City Beemers, but along the way ...

During our lunch stop at the Genoa Country Deli, President Gordy pre-

New Zealand Exposure...

Most of us have undertaken a tour of some sort on a motorbike whether it's a couple of days with your mates somewhere for the weekend, or a couple of weeks around the country. For motorcyclists more often than not its the journey which is more interesting than the destination. How many of you though, have shipped your bikes to a pre-determined destination, ridden for a few weeks and then shipped them back home again? One or two I'm sure, but an distances. Both the North and increasing number of motorcyclists are doing just that to experience motorcycling in New Zealand, or taking the easier option and renting a motorcycle on arrival in 'The Land of the Long White Cloud' to commence their touring experience.

For many New Zealand is the land of sheep and the mighty All Blacks

rugby team, but for those in the know NZ also represents motorcycling nirvana. New Zealand is roughly the same size as the US state of Colorado

or just under one-quarter the land mass of South Africa – big enough to see plenty of varying terrain and small enough not to have daunting South Islands are roughly of similar size and there are regular inter island car-ferry (similar in size to the English Channel car-ferrys) sailings traversing the three hour journey of Cook Strait. Foreign motorcyclists are always pleasantly surprised how readily kiwi motorcyclists return a wave, or to receive help from fellow motorcyclists if they involved in a breakdown on



the side of the road.

If you have ever considered motorcycling in New Zealand, you will be in for a treat. The North Island has the volcanic activity, great beaches with many awe inspiring coastal roads, whilst the South Island has the majestic mountains, sweeping forests and relatively uncongested roads and wide open spaces. If one is pushed for time, two weeks motorcycling can adequately cover the major points of interest throughout New Zealand. Summer is the main touring season from November through to March, and indeed in the month of February both islands are jam-packed with touring motorcyclists. Highways in New Zealand are classified by a State Highway (SH) numbering system and virtually all are tar-sealed. Many of New Zealand rural tar-seal roads are undulating and windy, so it is relatively easy to approach a corner with too much speed. South Islands roads are of a better quality tar-seal than the North Island roads due to a ready supply of river shingle for seal chip. Whilst there are thousands of kilometres of gravel roads in the rural parts of New Zealand, nearly all arterial roads are tarseal, though in the more remote areas motorcyclists do have to pay attention to the locality of fuel stations – petrol is currently (Aug 2012) about \$NZ2.10/litre. Also to factor in are many one-lane bridges throughout the country, and each bridge with their own give way protocol which can easily catch out an unsuspecting motorist. Earlier this year New Zealand changed its right hand turn give-way (yield) road rule of the past 35 years, to that of the international community which brings the right hand turn rule in line with Australia.

Three recognized must rides routes of summer expect to encounter wet within the New Zealand motorcycling community for the North Island both starting from Auckland are: the 1000km Northland three day loop and the four day 1200km Round East Cape Run. The third candidate is the Volcanic Plateau 200km day ride loop from Taupo passing the three central North Island volcanoes of Mount Tongariro, Ngauruhoe and Ruapehu. For the South Island the must ride routes are the world rating 120km State Highway 94 - The Milford Sound Road- which is hard to beat with majestic mountains and alpine scenery, along with SH6 which goes the length of the South Island and includes the remote Westland coastal forests and accessible glaciers. If your looking for New Zealand's motorcycling festival calendar show-piece then the four day Burt Munro Challenge held in mid November will be for you (Munro was a Bonneville Salt Flats motorbike speed king from the 1960s). The Burt Munro Challenge is a four day festival of all sorts of motorcycle racing located at the southern most city of Invercargill. One thing you can not escape in New Zealand is the drizzle and/or rain and even if your planning to ride in the height

weather at some point of your motorcycle vacation. It always surprises me than when kiwi motorcyclists regale their bike yarns from yester-year they always seem to remember the rides that involved inclement weather.

New Zealand is one of the few countries in the world where Suzuki is regularly the annual top selling motorcycle marque, and with Honda second, they both have dealerships in nearly all the provincial main centres of the country, should any problems be encountered. BMW, Yamaha and Kawasaki have dealerships dotted around the country whereas Harley Davidson dealerships are not quite as prolific. Like any tour, failing to plan is planning to fail, however having said that New Zealand is an easy country to 'wing it' and to motorcycle tour on a day to day basis. So the next time your having your mates around for a few drinks and a barbeque, consider a kiwi motorcycle touring experience next summer. Unless you've been living under a rock, you probably already know we're moving from damp, Manchester Beach to dryer climates in Cloverdale for our 2012 RCB Fall Classic.

Hoping to draw record numbers of participants, we're cutting the co-payment in half (!) for early registrations.

Note that the co-payment only covers the RCB portion of the event. Individuals are still responsible for their camping fee (est. \$10) payable directly to the Cloverdale KOA.

My 2007 R1200RT has 34,000 miles on it with the ESA suspension that I absolutely love. I enjoy the ability to adjust the suspension on the fly...for example I can ride in solo mode with bags (one helmet with luggage) and set the ESA computer to normal mode while riding on the freeway. Once I exit the freeway and take some county roads I'll set the ESA to sport mode when the twisty roads appear while crossing the sierras. It's a flawless system that works for me and increases my enjoyment for my BMW RT.

My RT is getting older with more miles under her belt. Likewise I'm getting older at the age of 60 but my skeletal suspension is still working fine. I don't have any plans to replace any hip or knee joints, but my RT's suspension needs replacing so what are my choices?

The BMW ESA system can't be rebuilt so it must be replaced with identical OEM shocks and ESA components which will set you back \$3500 plus labor. Ohlin's has a new ESA compatible rear shock that will set you back \$3300 plus labor.

The Ohlin's has it's own ESA system that is compatible with BMW's system so it's a plug and play and you can use your existing dash settings... Very nice! It also has an auto setting where it will automatically adjust your comfort, normal and sport settings while you ride and your speed increases. Sounds great in theory, but lacking in practice. When you are riding a technically twisty road where you want to be in the sport setting the Ohlin's will have you in the normal setting because your speed isn't fast enough to automatically change the setting to sport mode. A definite disadvantage! Plus the Ohlin's is constructed of aluminum which requires more frequent rebuilding than a

shock made of steel.

In the small town of Scott's Valley, Ted Porter of Beemer Shop fame has your solution. Ted will special order a set of steel Wilbers shocks from Germany and then when they arrive will install everything while you wait for the paltry sum of \$1764! That's what I did on July 19, 2012.

The first week in June I called Ted Porter and consulted with him about the Wilbers conversion. I had read positive reports on various web sites and chat rooms so after speaking with Ted I began the ordering process.

The first thing Ted asked me was how much did I weigh in my riding gear (196 lbs). I also ride with luggage so I needed to weigh my bags and top case which should include items that I normally carry with me (67 lbs). If one rides with a passenger then what is their weight and what percentage of the time do they ride with you? In my case I ride solo 100% of the time. My style of riding is sport touring so that was noted in Ted's notebook. With a \$500 deposit via credit card my order was sent to Germany.

It takes about one month to have the shocks built and shipped to the Beemer Shop. You can have the shocks shipped to your address if you would like to do the installation and ESA conversion yourself, which involves removing the ESA servo motors from your OEM shocks and installing them onto your new Wilbers shocks, or have the dealer of your choice do the ESA conversion and installation for you. I decided to have the Beemer Shop do the ESA conversion and installation while I waited which took a total time of 5 hours. The Beemer Shop will give you a loaner bike in case you would like to tour the Santa Cruz area instead of sitting

around the lounge area.

The cost at the time I ordered was \$1214 for the two Wilbers shocks. The ESA conversion was \$135 and the fee for the installation of the shocks was \$315. I didn't bother to take my old shocks home with me. The total fee with tax was \$1764.12 and worth every penny!

Now that I've ridden my R1200RT for 800 miles I have a big smile on my face. I want to give you my impressions since the conversion.

When I rode my RT with the OEM system I always had the dash computer settings on one helmet and luggage and bounced between normal and sport settings. When ever I was on a two lane county road I would use the sport mode exclusively.

With the Wilbers I prefer the helmet only setting and usually ride in the comfort mode and then change to the normal mode on two-lane county or twisty mountain roads. I have found that the sport mode is to stiff and harsh. I also ride at a faster pace because the RT seems much more planted and solid and confidence inspiring. It's amazing how supple the ride feels over bumps yet there is no sensation of wallowing. The RT tracks as if it's on rails.

I love the improved ride. Count me in as a very satisfied customer and fan of the Beemer Shop and Ted Porter.


