Escaping Into The Delta

There aren't many places I would spread my ashes, but the Delta is one of them. A ride in the Delta is my way of curing any thoughts that life is anything but wonderful. There is nothing like a hundred miles over winding levee roads, a quiet mochurch in Clarksburg, a free excursion on the ferry

for refreshments. By the time I get home, my heart, soul and body feel rejuvenated.

The Delta is gorgeous place late in the day, especially on a Fall Sunday, when a few of those twisting elevated levee roads are so lonely that they feel like they were built just for me. The sun hangs low, shimmers on the sloughs, and throws its amber light across fields, bridges, and buildings.

My regular sorties into the Delta customarily start by dropping south on South River Road on the Yolo side of the Sacramento

River. Quickly out of West Sacramento, I soon find myself in Clarksburg, where I often take Netherlands Road which speeds me past tomato fields and vineyards. I grab a road along Elk Slough, so obscure that the map show it only as "Road on Levee". It pops me out onto Courtland Road, which winds its way to a swing bridge over Miner Slough onto Ryer Island. The levee road along Miner Slough feels like a track day practice with each coming turn, each turn I've tak-

into Rio Vista, and a visit to Al the Wop's looms ahead, a throwback in time, an old-fashion dieselmy heart, soul and powered cable ferryboat appearing untouched by the rapidly developing world around it. With increasing congestion on our roads, it strikes me that we may see more ferries in our future.

In just a few short minutes, the McCoy glides across Cache Slough, also the watery route for the Sacramento Deep Water just for me. The Channel, a man-made waterway over which a million tons of international cargo in deep sea vessels transit each year.

The ramp on the ferry drops to the ground. The attendant waves me on, and with a twist of the throttle I'm on my way to Rio Vista. A quick flip over the Rio Vista Bridge, and a hard left



turn points me north again on the Sacramento side of the river. On many a former occasion, I've diverted from this intersection around the Delta Loop, a scenic roadway reminiscent of the old Delta with its marinas and casual waterfront lifestyle. Accelerating north on Route 160, Isleton lies ahead. If you're hungry, there's the Hotel del Rio with its prime rib buffet offered each weekend or Rogelio's with its unique menu of Mexican and Chinese.

Further north is Walnut Grove. If you've not had dessert, Mel's offers Gunther's Ice Cream with an overlook of the river that folks ride miles to see. Albeit, my favorite place is up the road a little further in Locke. Historically, a Chinese farming community, it now feels like a movie set relatively unchanged with time. In the middle of its unnamed main street is Al



the Wop's, a restaurant with a name that appears politically on the sign out front. Its interior is as eclectic as any place I've ever been, its walls adorned with years of accumulated paraphernalia. After a few libations, a favorite pastime at Al's is trying to hook your ball cap on the antlers of the deer which hangs over the bar. For the more coordinated, they try to stick At the Painterville Bridge, I slip back across to the Yolo side of a dollar bill into the ceiling with a thumb tack. Not so easy, if you bear in mind the ceiling is eighteen feet high and you can't reach it.

The usual barkeep, John, who is a teacher in his other life, now knows me well enough to holler in his gravelly voice, "Coffee or Diet Coke?" Most of the time, it will depend on the time of

there's no bad time to ride the Delta!



December 2004 From the newsletter editor's desk

Our own RCB genius Tom Austin wrote in the Long Distance rider email list why you should use premium gas if your motorcycle needs it... and why it's a waste of money if it doesn't.

Ethanol contains only 2/3 of the energy content of the average gasoline. Therefore, a 10% ethanol gasoline blend ("Gasohol") has only 96.7% of the energy content of straight gasoline. Any modern automobile and any motorcycle with an exhaust oxygen sensor (e.g., all new BMWs, many new Hondas) will get about

3% lower fuel economy using a 10% ethanol gasoline blend. (In California, the ethanol content is 5.7% and the fuel economy hit is about 2%.) For motorcycles that don't use oxygen sensors, there is less of a fuel economy penalty; however, the engine runs a little leaner, which adversely affects drivability and performance.

An engine designed to run on premium fuel will usually (see exception described below) exhibit spark knock on regular grade. Spark knock leads to overheating and engine damage. To run on regular, it is necessary to use a lower compression ratio or retarded spark timing. This reduces performance and fuel economy. However, if the engine uses a lower compression ratio to enable operation on regular grade fuel, there is no advantage to using premium. On average, premium fuel has slightly lower energy content than regular fuel. So if you have a motorcycle that is designed to run on regular grade gasoline, it is a waste of money to use premium.

Note that some of the higher tech motorcycles (e.g., the new R1200GS) are equipped with knock sensors that automatically retard spark timing as necessary to tolerate lower octane Caruthe fuel. They will run on regular grade gasoline without knocking but get better fuel economy and performance on premium.

The November issue of <u>Bike</u> from England has a monthly Q & A column. This months Question concerned aquaplaning with a motorcycle.

Motorcycle tires are much narrower than auto tires so we have much less a chance for aquaplaning. <u>Bike</u> says, "Bikes will aquaplane if you hit a 1mm flood at 200 mph. Conversely, you can ride through a river at 1 mph and you'll be fine."

Since we have to lean the bike to corner we are much less aggressive when riding in the rain versus the auto driver who hasn't a clue and drives as if the weather is dry and clear. The consequence of sliding a bike are far more serious than sliding a car, therefore we are much more likely to slow down to a reasonable speed in the wet. The odds of aquaplaning are very small so be smooth and enjoy your rain gear!


