

THE "DOCTOR" IS IN

BIKER KARAOKE BAR

It must be fun to go to a karaoke bar frequented by motorcyclists. Just listening to the songs with butchered lyrics like "hold me closer, Tony Danza" by Elton John; "it doesn't make a difference if we're naked or not" - by Bon Jovi; "like a virgin, touched for the thirty-first time" - by Madonna, can really

make one chuckle. Anyway, I am not surprised. Bikers are subjected to high noise levels which can lead to hearing loss.

Some might assume that our Harley brethren probably have it worse because of their loud pipes and less than full face helmets. Some might also assume that we, with our soulful relatively guiet BMWs and full face helmets are immune to hearing loss. Not so fast. Loud pipes and helmets are only a small part of the equation. It turns out that wind noise plays a more prominent role. Wind noise is the "amount of noise turbulence produced around the head while the rider is in motion" (not the noise you hear sitting beside someone after a great meal at Susie's). Our ears are affected by sound pressure (loudness in decibels), duration of exposure and frequency (in hertz). According to Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), motorcycles produce between 80-110 dB(A) of noise. To put it in perspective, the table below shows the different environmental noise levels. When travelling above 40 mph, wind noise obscures engine noise making the engine noise not as important . At 65 mph and 100 mph, the wind noise is approximately at 100 dB (A) and 110 dB(A) respectively. Frequency is the pitch of the sound with higher frequency appearing louder, or more painful than the lower frequency at the same pressure. The table below also shows the maximum duration of exposure to noise by decibels. Prolonged exposure to unsafe noise levels can initially lead to temporary threshold shift, which is the sudden decrease in hearing acuity after a long noisy ride. Frequent prolonged exposures to unsafe noise levels will make the threshold shift permanent, hence permanent hearing loss.

This actually makes us - RCB'ers- a bit more prone to hearing loss since we ride longer and for some, faster.

Some noises are important and necessary. These are extraneous noises that help us survive our passion. Ambulance siren, engine noise, car horns, GPS and intercom audibles, screeching brakes, monthly meetings, voice of our esteemed prez (though the last one is debatable), are what I would consider helpful and necessary noise. Wind noise however, is unnecessary noise. We do not need it and it does not have any beneficial effect. Wind noise causes rider fatigue, headache, dysequilibrium and more

importantly hearing loss.

To be able to enjoy our passion for longer periods of time, we need solutions to decrease unnecessary noise. Newer helmet technology, adjustments in fairing, handlebar height and windshield can reduce wind noise by about 5-6%, which unfortunately is not enough to lower it to consistently safe levels at all speeds. Wearing ear protection can reduce wind noise significantly. Most of us adhere to ATGATT in terms of crash injury protection. We should also consider to include some form of ear protection to protect from ear injury. There are many out there available ranging from the cheap ear foams to the most sophisticated custom molded bluetooth ear plugs. The key is to reduce the unnecessary noise more than the necessary noise. Some say that the musicians ear plugs are the best because it attenuates sound across all frequencies. Foam plugs can attenuate sound by 20 - 30 dB if fitted correctly, though it does attenuate mainly in the higher frequencies. Each will have its pros and cons. Cost, fit, comfort, material and extra features all may factor in ones personal choice. Get what fits right that you will use.

RCB RIDER SKILLS IMPROVEMENT DAY

SUNDAY, JUNE 23

Whether you commute every day, enjoy touring, or taking a leisurely day ride around town, it's time for a riding class. RCB will be offering a riding class on Sunday, June 23, 2013, at the Reno Fernley Raceway. The track is an environment that offers:

- Debris free asphalt.
- Corner workers who notify riders of safety hazards.
- Runoff areas, no cliffs, rock walls, curbs, telephone poles, guardrails, or trees.
- No on-coming traffic or dangerous cross-traffic and No speeding tickets.
- You will not have to think about anyone using a mobile phone, applying makeup, shaving, texting, eating, or fighting with their kids or spouse while on the track.

The RCB philosophy is to provide an environment where each rider is able to achieve their individual goals, and work to become a more skilled and safer rider. This is NOT a race. RCB understands the best way to learn is in a relaxed and stress free environment where friends, not competitors, are participants.

Basic Rider Requirements:

Minimum Age: You must be 18, or a parent or guardian must be at the track to sign the required waiver.

Motorcycle License: You must have a valid driver's license with a motorcycle endorsement. Insurance: RCB takes precautions to ensure that the event is safe, but cannot control everything. You ride at your own risk. RCB does not supply insurance for you or your bike.

Medical Insurance: You are required to keep proof of medical insurance coverage with you.

Motorcycle Insurance & Accident Costs: In the event of an accident you are fully responsible for all costs and potential liability, including any medical cost, transportation, or other costs of any kind (we can't list everything). Please be prepared, act responsibly, and take precautions for yourself and others.

Signed Waivers: When you arrive for registration, you must sign a release of liability for RCB and RFR. **Proper Riding Gear:** Common sense and RCB require proper riding gear – an undamaged DOT approved full face helmet with face shield; full leathers, or two-piece leather suit that zips together, or full zip style Cordura (nylon) one-piece (Aerostich), or two piece Cordura zip-together motorcycle suits are acceptable; above the ankle, motorcycle-specific boots; and motorcycle specific gauntlet style gloves are required. CE approved (or similar) body armor, back protector & ear plugs are strongly recommended.

Bike Preparation: Tires and brakes should be in new or nearly new condition. There can be no evidence of coolant or oil leaks. Taping wheel weights is required, and duct tape works well. Tape over all lenses, and remove mirrors. Blue painters tape works best, and doesn't leave residue. No light should be visible, or bleed through tape. Tape over the speedometer. The reason for taping is to eliminate distractions to you and your fellow riders. By reducing distractions, you can focus on what is important!

Cost: RCB Members \$170.00 per participant up to May 15, 2013, \$185.00 after May 15. Participation fee must be RECEIVED by RCB by May 15 to obtain the discounted fee. Non-members \$185.00, and this includes a six month limited RCB membership. You can go to the RCB Website for more details. www.rcb.org

BMW RECALLS 2013 R1200GS

BMW has issued a recall for its redesigned 2013 R1200GS. The recall concerns a loose locking bolt for the front fork. The defect potentially affects 15 units shipped to BMW dealers.



Documents filed with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration state BMW discovered a potential issue in late January 2013. A BMW endurance riding test showed a loose locking bolt on the company's proprietary telelever front fork, with the torque determined to be below spec. Subsequent tests in January and Februrary revealed the extent of bolt loosening concluding that "an insufficient seal between the locking bolt and fork tube would cause the bolt to loosen over time."



A voluntary recall was issued in February, with all the potentially affected units (535) in hold at a BMW North America facility. However, inventory records indicate 15 units may have been

shipped to dealers that did not undergo the internal inspection and repair prompting the current recall.

BMW will notify owners, with dealers inspecting and fixing the locking bolt issue free of charge. If it is determined that the fork tube has loosened, the tube and locking bolt will also be replaced. GS owners can contact BMW at 1-800-525-7417 or email at CustomerRelations@bmwusa.com for more details.

This recall is the first for the 2013 GS in the U.S., but the new bike has already faced two further recalls in Canada. The first was for a potential transmission oil leak at the output shaft, from the oil pressure being too high. The second issue regarded the Automatic Stability Control (ASC) system not reactivating after off-road use in the "Enduro-Pro" mode.
