Any ride is more fun.

My daughter finished and passed her Basic Rider Course. Now what? Here are a few notions I jotted down for her. As we start another riding season, perhaps we all should ponder these notions.

TURNS:

- Vision/Perception,
 Braking, Shifting and
 Decision-Making
 - Get any of these wrong and you may experience some anxiety. Get it really wrong? Panic? NO!! Relax, Focus on the exit, and the bike will go there.

Tactics

- Reference Points –
 Vision Look through the corner to the exit
- Actively Gage the Topography
 - Ex.: If the road is cut out of a hillside and all you see ahead is sky, there is a near certainty the road turns toward the hillside, perhaps sharply.
- Reduce Tasks –

 "Ride The Motor"

 eliminating shifting and
 use engine braking
- Plan Ahead Get Braking, Down

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Shifting Completed Quickly and Early

 Develop Skills/Confidence to Carry More Speed

Goals

ID What You Do Well – Practice / Reinforce Those Skills

ID Weaknesses – Build Skill

ID "Bad Habits" – Break Them

- When You Make a Mistake, Try To Do It Again. WHAT? Yep, then you have an opportunity to ID the mistake and Break the Habit

However, the unpredictable & often changeable weather for this early spring time cooperated & gave us beautiful cool clear days devoid of wind with clean dry pavement both travel days. Fifteen River City Beemer's attended this year's event filling 6 of the Inn's 9 rooms. This was the year of the GS as Tony & Judy Spadaro, Louis Galiano with Lucia Hicks & Greg Peart rode the only motors this year.

Breakfast at Eppie's was great as usual and enjoyed by Cyndee & Greg Peart, Lisa & Bruce Cornelius, Judy & Tony Spadaro with Louis Galiano & Lucia Hicks. Chuck & Marilyn Tally met us at the Inn with in-laws Dale & Becky as their guests. New to the group were the Pearson's, Tracy, Marc & A J who drove from Napa. I have met and remember these three as BMW Rally attendees from other events in northern California, as Tracy rides her own motor. I know our RCB group will remember them from attending our Christmas parties. Also new to the tour this year were Louis Galiano & Lucia Hicks. Louis & I know each other from a local car club we both belong to.

At 9 AM and with full gas tanks two BMW GS riders took off for what would be an absolutely great ride over to Mendocino. Louis & Lucia had to go back home for something and were behind us about an hour. Red Bud was just beginning to bloom and the wild flowers that are generally everywhere were rather sparse this year but if you looked close you would see some in early blooming stages. Cyndee Peart chased us in an SUV and the Cornelius's chased her with their SUV. Lunch was had at Jim Town Store which just continues to delight the taste buds with great food. After a top off of gas in Cloverdale it was smooth sailing over to the coast on Hwy. 128. Traffic had been and stayed light as most people I am sure were thinking it would rain all weekend. That certainly was not the case. Our weather, perfect.

Upon our arrival at the Sea Gull Inn Jim Douglas advised of a new Italian food restaurant in town called, Luna Trattoria. The food here is not only great but fair priced too. The late-night Mendocino Hotel Irish Coffee drinkers were less this night but intent to delight on desert and drink anyway. Michael took care of us just the same even getting to rest a while, sit and chat with us as the hotel was not busy this night. A charming Port was the choice of the night for several lucky attendees.

As usual when you are having a good time the time just disappears all too fast. Sunday morning came all too soon and an hour earlier due to day light saving time. But I must say when you wake up and see a clear bright morning and then get a delicious Sea Gull Inn Bed & Breakfast, breakfast delivered right to your room it can't be much better. So around 10 AM everyone departed. Greg Peart left with the Spadaro's, Cyndee Peart & the Cornelius's in chase heading over to Clear Lake on Highway 20 for Granzella's and lunch. The others departed back toward the Napa Valley for home. I did not see any whales this year. And I did spend some time looking intently as I am the one who named this tour, The Whale of a Tour Ride. Maybe next year. But until then, this was the best Whale of a Tour Ride ever!





Nevada Outback Ride #2 Porter Spring, NV June 22 – 24, 2018

Join other RCB'ers for the second annual Nevada Outback ride to Porter Spring (our basecamp). Porter Spring, an oasis in the desert, is located northwest of Lovelock on the backside of the Seven Trough range, in the Kumiva Valley. Departure time and location TBD.

A little history on the Seven Troughs area; it grew out of a gold rush in the early 1900's. By the end of 1907, the population was around 350 people. After 1918, with the ore bodies depleted, the area was abandoned. All that remains now are the ghost towns of Mazuma, Tunnel, and Vernon.



Mazuma was the largest camp in the area. Founded in 1907, it had a newspaper, post office, bank, hotel, stores, and fire department. During a summer afternoon storm in July 1912, a ten foot wall of water came cascading down Seven Troughs Canyon and washed the community away. Many buildings were destroyed, others washed off their foundations. The most enduring artifact is a payroll safe from a mining company that was washed a short distance down the canyon. It still lies next to the trail today. Eleven people were killed in the flash flood, with some of the bodies being recovered in a wash five miles away. Six of the deceased are buried east of the area in a makeshift cemetery. Nevada Magazine published a great article on the Mazuma disaster http://nevadamagazine.com/home/archives/mazuma-wiped-out/.

Tunnel Camp came later. In 1927, a cyanide mill was built on the site and the boring of a tunnel began through the mountain to the Seven Troughs mine on the other side. With hopes of improving ventilation and drainage of the Seven Troughs, as well as improving the logistics of getting ore from the mine to the mill, over two miles of tunnels were completed. Gold was found along the way, but ultimately the project was abandoned in 1934. Various mining activities continued off and on at Tunnel up into the 1950's.

Vernon was founded in 1905 to serve as a base for the nearby mines in the Seven Troughs mining district. The mines remained active for the better part of three to four years, but by 1910 the ore was depleted, so the mines began to reduce operations and/or close down entirely. By 1918, Vernon had so few people the post office closed its doors. At this time, many of the wooden buildings were torn down and moved to nearby Tunnel Camp, where activity was on the increase. Vernon's fate was sealed and the last of its residents moved on shortly thereafter.

Saturday, June 23, if there's enough rider interest, we can ride the back roads and do a loop with stops along the way. We can checkout Rabbithole Springs (a popular watering hole for early settlers coming west on the California Trail), cross over to the playa at Trego Hot Spring and exit Ten Mile Playa Access. Head into Gerlach on Hwy 34 and have lunch at Bruno's and fill-up at the Shell station. After lunch, we'll head south on Hwy 447 turning off on Jungo Road. Then make our way back to Porter Springs via the Lava Beds route. It's important to have final rider counts by Saturday, June 2, so supplies can be purchased. Like last year's event, all food, water, fuel, and firewood will have to be brought in. This is a GS/Dirt Bike ride, so sport bikes and touring bikes aren't recommended. Since I am sponsoring this event again this year, any assistance by participants would be appreciated. If you have any questions, please email me.

Looking forward to getting out and exploring the Nevada Outback again with fellow RCB'ers. Bye for now.
