

An Answer to the Winter Request From Greg Gibson




Here is a picture loading up bikes in Meadow Valley between Buck's Lake and Quincy. I was Gypsy Tour Chairman that year (2000) with Lars Swartz. I was driving the sweep truck and also had my R100PD on the trailer in case I got a chance to ride. Pictured is Russ Drake's R1100RT on the trailer as his bike's alternator belt broke right there. I got a call from Russ while on my way up Feather River Cyn after checking in the riders at the Grass Valley ride start point that morning.

Right after hanging up from Russ, I got a weak garbled call from CJ Gilzean whose KTM spun a rear sprocket near Berry Creek on the way over to Quincy from Oroville. I tried to ask CJ to see how far he could get towed towards Bucks Lake, in order to save me some part of the drive back over to pick him up. The call dropped, so I had no idea if he heard any of that suggestion.



I continued up Feather River Canyon and back to Quincy towards Bucks Lake. I found Russ alongside the road waiting. I had to unload my PD to send Russ on my bike (pictured behind the trailer with a much younger Chris Clark) in order to have room for CJ's bike. While finishing up tying Russ' bike down, I heard the sound of a few bikes coming down the hill from Bucks Lake and was flabbergasted to see CJ at the end of a rope with Gerry O'Callahan as tow pilot. They had come across the entire Buck's Lake Road in tow during a rainstorm in about the time I drove the same distance at highway speeds on 70. Gerry's subsequent RCB write up is one of the all-time best ever printed. This is the backstory, which only those that participated in one of the great Gypsy Tours ever are aware of. (Editor's Note: I was part of that group at the beginning of my return to riding – which is code for tentative and slow especially given the weather. The weather was horrible – it rained hard all day. I could not keep up with O'Callahan towing CJ's KTM. If anyone has a copy of Gerry's account of the day, please send me a copy.)

The picture below is CJ at Cedarville Fairgrounds that night.



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Russ was able to scrounge up an alternator belt, so CJ rode the rest of the Gypsy Tour on my PD. Pretty much everybody was tenting on the floor of the main barn due to rain and snow. The snow would continue the following day through Tionesta and around the backside of Mt Shasta on our way to Hayfork.

(Editor's Note: I was going to bail on this Gypsy Tour due to the weather forecast for the weekend. I was shamed into going most likely by Jim Cyran, but I really do not remember who the tormentor was.

The volunteer firemen in Cedarville had a bar set up for us and rustled up a fantastic BBQ dinner. The firemen pours made many tough men cry the next morning.

As my daughter would say: Makin' Memories.)

Mapping - For Those of Us Who Grew Up in the Carbon Paper Age Y. 2 By Jack

A new member, Vicky Jo Moran, sent me an e-mail after reading my article about using Google Maps and a Garmin GPS. Thanks for the note Vicki!

Vicki wrote:

"I sometimes use google maps to create a gpx file and download it to my Garmin Nav VI or Zumo device. It has always worked fine. I use file converter to convert .kml files to .gpx files and vice versa. See this link for amazing things you can do to files and it is free: https://www.gpsvisualizer.com/map_input?form=googleearth They have always worked. It amazes me. There are some tricks to learn in how to find the file and to display it on your device. But it has always worked."

I have not had a chance to experiment with this program. Its use may make the process easier. If you give it a try let me know how it worked.

Greg wrote:

"I followed your newsletter instructions and was able to create a route on My Maps. I then converted it using 20 points and had to drag the file from the download folder to a folder on basecamp. However, I have not been able to load the route on to the GPS as it lays out on the basecamp map. Part of the problem may be that I used my home address as the start/finish point, and the GPS does not see that as a route. (Garmin 680t)."

I'm not sure what may have happened, but I wrote Greg yesterday:

If the Google Map route was converted to a Garmin file in Basecamp it likely was a .gpx file. These files work in the Nav type GPS's that BMW sells with the newer bikes.

Older Garmin GPS's may not "read" a .gpx file. The route needs to be converted to a Garmin .gdb file. I have not found a way to do that in Basecamp (although that may be my lack of knowledge). (We used to be able to right click on a selected route in Map



Source and the properties of the route was an option. Once in a route's properties we had options to modify the route. I have not found a similar feature in Basecamp.)

I create a file / folder on my desktop. I click on / highlight the route I want, click on File - Export - Export selection. You then get to a dialogue box where you pick the file folder where you want to move / export the route. Pick the folder you made on your desktop.

DON'T SAVE IT YET.

At the bottom of the box you have two lines. One says file name. You can give the route whatever name you want by typing it in there. (It defaults to what you named the route in Basecamp.)

The line below identifies the file type. This is the key. Click on the down arrow on the far right. A menu of file types drops down. Click on file type .gdb. Once that file type is identified as the file type in that line you can click save.

You now have a .gdb type route in the folder that can be downloaded to your GPS via Basecamp (by moving it into a Basecamp list), or using MapSource if it will work on your GPS.

Part of what I wrote Greg yesterday was wrong. I wrote today:

I spent about an hour on the phone with two Garmin technical support guys today. I was advised most of the newer GPS units will accept and work with a .gpx route file. They specifically said Zumo, Montana, and 64's should work with a .gpx route file. I will try using my Montana when I have a chance.

The bottom line with Basecamp is it only will create a .gpx route file.

To create a .gdb route file you will have to go through what I wrote last night.

If you try to import a .gdb route file into Basecamp (to download it to a GPS for example), Basecamp will automatically convert it to a .gpx file.

If you have an older Garmin GPS that only will work with a .gdb route file you must use Map Source, assuming you still have it and it still works.

If you have experimented or have used this process, please send me a note about your experience and share what you learned.


DISCOUNT FOR RCB MEMBERS AT CLEARWATER LIGHTS!!




