Wednesday Night Dinner Ride


Location: Coffee Republic 6610 Folsom-Auburn Road. Folsom, CA 95630

BMW MOA MEMBERS SAVE 20% ON TELEMEDICINE SERVICE

The BMW Motorcycle Owners of America have secured another member benefit for MOA members - 20% off the annual cost of telemedicine benefits from CareClix. For many patients, telemedicine can bring nearly immediate relief through diagnosis of common ailments and, for some, a prescription being ordered through your local pharmacy faster than if you visited your physician's office.

CareClix provides 24/7 on-demand access to board-certified US licensed physicians who consult and diagnose by phone or high definition video call from any device, and if needed, prescribe medication for common and acute illnesses. After calling the CareClix toll free number, a CareClix representative will request your demographics and symptoms. A medical doctor will call you back to conduct the consultation and prescribe as needed. Receive care 24 hours a day, seven days a week from any mobile device.

Why telemedicine from CareClix? In 2019, the average Emergency Room visit cost \$3,000 to \$5,000. Average primary care visits range from \$130 to \$190. The average telehealth visit costs about \$79 including co-pay and prescriptions.

CareClix membership is \$49 per year. However, BMW MOA members receive a 15% discount and pay only \$41.50 annually for the service. Members may also choose to save an additional 5% by selecting the auto renewal feature and never worry about a missed premium or lapse in coverage. Physician service requires a \$25 co-pay, payable by credit card, and any prescription medicine costs.

MOA members can **<u>PURCHASE CARECLIX COVERAGE ONLINE</u>**. Enter the membership code SAVEME20 to active the discounted pricing for MOA members.

Initial enrollment requires a 30-day waiting period before services begin, however no waiting period is necessary for renewals with no lapse in coverage.



No worries, there are many other options and Titus might reopen.

Off to the charcoal kilns under a partly cloudy sky with a few sprinkles here and there. A benefit of riding after rain is the dirt is tacky for great traction and no dust.

Below is a photo of the kilns. The kilns were built in 1877. Pinion pine was cut down in this mountain area (elevation 6800 feet plus). About 35 cords of wood were loaded into a kiln and the wood was allowed to burn slowly for a week or so until it was reduced to charcoal. The charcoal would sit in the kiln for another week until it cooled down. The charcoal was transported to the Modock (Modoc) mine smelter about 25 miles to the west where silver and lead ore was processed. The mine was partly owned by the famous (infamous) George Hearst.



A very prolific gold mining area called Skidoo was next on the itinerary. Many probably have heard the phrase 23 Skidoo. Origins are unknown but here is one possibility.

- An early 1900s Death Valley town had 23 saloons (many basically tents). A visit to all, *going 23 skidoo*, meant having a very good time.
- Death Valley National Park interpreters have sometimes given as an explanation that the early 1900s mining town of Skidoo, California required that a water line be run from the source of water on Telescope Peak to the town – a distance of 23 miles. Most thought it would be easy, but the immensely hard rock along the course made it very difficult; it was eventually accomplished by a determined engineer. The term "23 Skidoo" was then used as a statement of irony, something like "duck soup": a reference to something apparently easy, but actually very difficult. Other interpreters simply say the 23-mile pipeline and the popular slang phrase is what gave the town its name.

Skidoo Mill


Powered by water piped from a spring high in the Panamint Range, the Skidoo Mill extracted gold from ore and was one of Death Valley's most profitable operations. Skidoo had the only water-powered milling plant in Death Valley.

The Skidoo Mill is only partially stabilized. Its machinery is dangerous; its timbers are decaying. For your safety and the preservation of the site, please stay out of the ruin.

Federal law protects all historic ruins and artifacts within Death Valley National Park. Please leave them undisturbed for others to discover.


