On the left front to back are Ray, Terry and Al. On the right front to back are Steve, Maggie, Henry and Jack.




#### Carrizo Plain Mike Robles

Here is a short ride report for a 3-day ride to Carrizo Plain down a bit out of San Luis Obispo.

We do club trips to Morro Bay most years but really, we don't spend much time in the So-Cal area. When you think of So-Cal you think traffic. Not where we went.

We started with a circuitous route through the delta to Livermore where we topped off our fuel and headed up Mines Rd. and over Mt. Hamilton. There were still beautiful wildflower blooms all over the Mt. Hamilton area. We were hoping we might see the same thing in Carrizo Plain which is famous for it's wildflower super blooms.

We continued by running along the eastside of San Jose where we cut through to Gilroy to 152 W. Hecker Pass over to the coast.



The only real traffic we dealt with was in the Monterey area where lane splitting made short work of it and we were GONE!



Happy to report that Highway 1 is indeed fully open through Big Sur where we stopped for fuel as there isn't any for a ways when you clear Big Sur.

We cut over to 101 just north of Atascadero where we jumped on 58 to Santa Margarita to a KOA 7 miles out of town. This is a very nice KOA. The staff was great, and we had a great campsite. WARNING! Bring water as the well water is not great. It had a yellow tint, and we were assured it was ok to drink as it had been treated. We decided NO!!!!! The store had gallon jugs so we went that route.

Saturday, we headed down Pozo Rd. which is another great road in this area where we ended up on a half lane, barely paved, rutted road up to the top of Black Mtn. road. There is a radar site at the top and the view is spectacular even though the road gives your suspension a workout. It was an adventure but, this road is off of my bucket list. You only need to do this one once.









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We then worked our way back to 58 and entered Carrizo Plain National Monument



where the road went from paved to dirt to frickin' SAND! Hitting sand at 55 mph when not expecting it is pretty exciting. I'm not a huge fan of sand on a GS but the three of us made it through the stuff with no mishaps. I was happy to see the last section of pavement.


# American River Resort Jack Klauschie


We arrived Friday after work and enjoyed cocktails with friends after cooking dinner.

Jenny and Lynell made coffee and whipped up breakfast Saturday morning which helped clear some self-induced fog from my old noggin.























#### **MOA National Rally Reminder**

#### **Riding Tips**

#### **March 2007**

(Editor: Part of this was a reprint in March 2007 of a column Gary wrote in 1997. It applies today just as it has since 1997 and is a good reminder as we kick start Club rides after being locked down for over a year.)

As the busiest time of the motorcycling year is starting to arrive I find it necessary to ask if you can spare me a couple of seconds. No, I'm not trying to drum up a little 'volunteer' help on club activities or projects. But as more and more people are starting to join in the club rides, I could sure use those two or three seconds. What I'm talking about of course is the two or three seconds I'd like you to leave between us as we're riding. When you're in front of me, I'll be at least two seconds behind. And I'd sure appreciate it if you would return the favor when I'm in front of you. (Of course, if you're getting ready to blast past me I'll understand.)

You see, I sometimes slow or stop abruptly for no apparent reason. Sometimes it's because I think I see a hazard in the road. Sometimes I think I might see something approaching from a side road or a field. Maybe a kamikaze dog trying to beat me to some imaginary finish line. As I am also an Airhead, sometimes it's just a field full of sheep. At any rate I have only three options for avoiding hazards. Speed up, slow down, or swerve. But when I have another motorcycle close on my backside, 1/3 of my options are eliminated. I become reluctant to hit the brakes hard for fear that the rider behind me might not be able to react in time. And if I'm also following the rider in front of me too closely, 2/3 of the options are gone.

When you're riding in a group do you keep track of the bikes behind you? I do. But quite often I find myself checking the mirror for a bike that was behind me last time I looked, only to find it missing. But it's not missing, just tucked into my blind spot. I even have those little convex mirrors to help eliminate the blind spot, but there's still a big enough one to park a motorcycle in.



Sometimes when I'm leading a ride, I'm not actually too sure where the next turn is. But if I've got a little room behind me I can slow abruptly and make the turn. Have you ever been in a group of riders all making U turns because the leader missed the turn?? It's not pretty. Two or three seconds; it's really not a whole lot to ask.

A few suggestions for group riding: Have a full tank of gas to start with. The ride leader will usually plan for gas stops every 150 miles or so. If you have a longer range than 150 miles it would be a good idea to fuel when everyone else does unless you can run 300 miles. When a departure time has been agreed upon, be on your bike with all your gear on at that time. Some ride leaders will use their GPS time to make sure they engage the clutch at the precise second (Mea Culpa) Lastly, watch for the rider behind you in your mirrors and wait for them to see you make a turn if they have fallen behind. If you don't want the rider ahead to wait for you, make sure to make that known. Don't get discouraged by all these 'rules'. They're really just a few simple things that make a group ride safe and fun for all.


