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


As you see below, the weather was horrible.

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Nevada Outback By Scott Moseman

As El Presidente Mike alluded to in his October Prez Corner, a handful of RCB loons descended upon the Frog Ponds late Thursday afternoon to partake in a weekend of teeth rattling and bone jarring dirt bike riding.



Located at the edge of the Black Rock Desert playa, the Frog Ponds are located roughly twenty miles southeast of Gerlach, NV off Jungo Road. A big thank you goes out to Mr. Robert Redd of Lovelock, landowner, who gave our group permission to camp.



Upon arrival, we all went to work setting up camp. As the sun set, the desert cold moved in, and we were all huddled around the camp fire watching the Giants/Dodgers baseball play-off game on Mike's smart phone. Imagine that, in the middle of BFE, live streaming a baseball game. Mike made the comment that it didn't "buffer" one time. Of course, it helps when there's a newly installed cell tower a couple of miles away. There's no doubt this new tower was installed to accommodate the trendy Burning Man crowds that are self-absorbed sending "hedonistic selfies" to the masses.

Did I mention the desert cold? The low Friday morning was 24 degrees. Water in my washbasin was frozen solid. Thankfully, Mike Robles brought his propane powered fire pit and fired it up. We drank hot coffee and watched the sun come up over Old Razorback Mountain. Once the sun came up, the temperature slowly started to warm. After some breakfast burritos and more coffee, it was time to put on our riding gear and prepare our dirt bikes for the first ride of the day.





We departed camp around 10AM, heading south through the Kumiva Valley, our destination, Skull Rock located in the Lava Beds. The Lava Beds are misnamed, as their origins aren't volcanic at all. They are a granite plateau that was formed millions of years ago when the area was under an ancient ocean. The rock is comprised of soft decomposing granite. Wind and water erosion have sculpted these outcroppings into strange figures with names such as Skull Rock and Elephant Rock.



After about an hour of riding, we reached Skull Rock (elevation 6,000 feet).









We ate some snacks and took some pictures, then headed to Pete's Cabin. Pete's Cabin is an old cowboy shelter nestled at the base of a large granite outcropping. Inside the cabin, there's an old iron stove and some canned goods on a shelf. Not a five-star destination, but if you were caught in a storm and needed shelter, this place might save your life.

Back on the bikes again, our group headed back to camp. Down another valley "dirt superhighway", we turned off on a shortcut. This trail had some areas of deep sand and loose gravel washes, testing us old guys and our off-road riding skills. Completing a sixty-mile loop, everyone made it back to camp without any incidents.

Later that afternoon, I led two other riders to Black Rock Point. About seven miles from camp, out on the playa, Mike's bike quit running. After about 45 minutes, we had no luck getting it started. So, I rode back to camp to have my son, Bryce, drive his truck out to pick the bike up and bring it back to camp. Once back at camp, we all went to work tearing the bike apart to determine why it wouldn't start. We determined that the spark plug wire had come loose from the ignition coil. After some dielectric grease and some electrical tape, Mike's bike fired up and he was back in business. Since it was late afternoon and the sun was starting to set, we elected to prepare the bikes for Saturday's ride and start dinner.

The cold returned as the sun disappeared over the horizon. Friday evening was another cold one, but not as cold as the night before. Saturday morning was cold, but once the sun came up, things warmed up nicely. After another hardy breakfast, the group geared up and took off for Black Rock Point.

Black Rock Point is the only black mountain in the area, thus the name Black Rock Desert. Its origins are volcanic and can be seen up to fifty miles away. It was used as a point of reference for wagon trains heading West during the mid-1800's.





At the base of Black Rock Point, there's a hot spring. This spring was used to water the animals that pulled and accompanied the settlers on their journey.



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We rode past Black Rock Point and continued East towards the two "mini" playas. At the second playa, we rode to the top of a rock island, where we stopped and took some pictures and admired the views. Once break time was over, we reversed our route and rode along the bottom of the Black Rock Mountain range to Double Hot Springs. These springs are over 180 degrees and are fenced off with warning signs. No soaking here.



These springs are of historical significance, as they were used by traveling settlers to water their livestock on the Apple Gate Trail.





The ten-mile trail to the springs had loose silt, sandy washes, whoops, tight corners, and standing water from rain earlier in the week. Up on the pegs, shifting your weight, working the throttle, while screaming along at speeds over 50 mph....a dirt biker's dream.

Once at Double Hot Springs, we waited for the group to come together before we made the trek back across the playa to our camp. It's important to account for everyone so no one gets left behind. Think Top Gun, "never leave your wingman".



On our way back to camp, some of us detoured to check out the model rockets that were being launched on the playa. During the fall, model rocket builders head out to the Black Rock to launch their home-made rockets. Because some of these rockets can go up to 100,000 feet or more, air traffic is restricted in the area. Google "model rockets Black Rock Desert". There are websites and videos to check out.

Everyone made it back to camp without any incidents. Saturday evening was spent having a nice dinner and discussing the days ride around the campfire. We all retired to bed before 10 PM, tired from the energy expensed trying to be young again.

The fourth annual Nevada Outback is in the books. Thanks to all the "loons" who made the trip out and enjoyable.
